Compelling Questions and Supporting Questions for Thomas Jefferson

Compelling Question:

How much power should a government have?

Supporting Questions: *Elementary:*

- 1. Why do we have rules?
- 2. What happens when a rule is not followed?
- 3. What does it mean for something to be "fair?"
 - 4. Can a rule change?
 - 5. Can a rule be "unfair?"

Middle School:

- 1. Do people always "practice what they preach?" Why or why not?
- 2. Can differences cause division between people, but in other ways also unite people?
 - 3. Why do people join clubs?
- 4. How can being a club member help someone have a sense of belonging?
 - 5. Can clubs and groups also isolate people?
 - 6. Is it possible to please all groups of people?

High School:

- 1. How should Jefferson be remembered?
- 2. Was Jefferson more a Federalist or Antifederalist in his personal and political lives? Defend your answer with evidence.

- 3. Evaluate Jefferson's impact on the new government before, during and after his presidency.
 - 4. If Jefferson were alive today, to which political party would he belong? Defend your answer with evidence.
- 5. Knowling the general values of federalists and anti-federalists, which do you think is more evident in our country today? Defend your answer with evidence.
- 6. What is the function of political parties today? Are the founding fathers' beliefs and reservations about political parties justified in today's politics?

Supporting Questions for February 17th:

Elementary:

- What is a constitution?
- What are the basic goals of the United States Constitution as outlined in the Preamble of the Constitution?
 - What does point of view or perspective mean?
- Why might different people have different points of view or perspectives on an issue or problem?
 - Why might people change their mind about a particular subject, issue, or problem?
 - What is the "media"?

Secondary:

- What does a "return to first principles mean?"
- What are the basic goals of the Constitution as outlined in the Preamble of the Constitution?
 - Should the government call balls and strikes or pick winners and losers?
- What did the Founders learn from political philosophy, history, and the colonial experience?
